[&]quot;Bernstein based the **Symphonic Dances** on his musical West Side Story. The **Prologue** is scored for 2 flutes, piccolo, 2 oboes, English horn, Eb clarinet, 2 Bb clarinets, bass clarinet, alto sax, 2 bassoons, contrabassoon, 4 horns, 3 trumpets, 3 trombones, tuba, xylophone, vibraphone, timpani, percussion, piano, harp, and strings [38 violins, 14 violas, 12 cellos, and 8 double basses]. **Somewhere** uses a smaller orchestral palette consisting of flutes, oboes, clarinets, bass clarinet, bassoons, contrabassoon, horns, trumpets, trombones, tuba, timpani, vibraphone, percussion, piano, harp, and strings.

OCO has always had an unusual combination of instruments so the Prokofiev and Bernstein have been re-orchestrated to suit OCO's current instrumentation.
