**Rimsky-Korsakov* completed Scheherazade in 1888 and scored "The Sea and Sinbad's Ship" for piccolo, 2 flutes, 2 oboes, 2 clarinets, 2 bassoons, 4 horns, 2 trumpets, 2 tenor trombones, bass trombone, tuba, timpani, harp, and strings (34 violins, 14 violas, 12 cellos, and 8 double basses). *Dvorák* wrote his ninth symphony in 1893, scoring the "Allegro con fuoco" movement for 2 flutes, 2 oboes, 2 clarinets, 2 bassoons, 4 horns, 2 trumpets, 2 tenor trombones, bass trombone, timpani, percussion, and strings (34 violins, 14 violas, 12 cellos, and 8 double basses).

OCO has always had an unusual combination of instruments so these pieces have been reorchestrated to create the best possible group sound with the current instrumentation: 6 violins, 2 violas, 2 cellos, 2 flutes, 2 oboes, 2 clarinets, bass clarinet, trumpet, bass trombone, harp, piano, timpani, glockenspiel, cymbal, and triangle.
